<Nothing much is known about John Burnby (occ. 1772–85) except that he was an attorney at law in Canterbury. This book about the cathedral was published anonymously, but a later book of his – a collection of light verse called 'Summer amusement' – identifies him as the author of this one too. The publishers were a firm of Canterbury booksellers who had set up their own printing-office in about 1769. A second edition, 'greatly enlarged', was published by another firm of Canterbury booksellers, Simmons and Kirkby, in 1783. They also had their own printing-office, the earliest products of which date from 1768. Page images of the second edition can be found at the address given below. A third edition (which seems to be just a reprint of the second) was published in 1799, again by Simmons and Kirkby. – C.F. October 2011.>
